A message from the CEO Mark Withers

Welcome to the spring edition of PAE Today.

I am delighted to be writing this message on behalf of the Council as we head towards the voting phase of the 2022 Council elections. Enrolments have now closed, and you will be receiving your ballot papers from 15 October. Voting in Council elections is not compulsory but it's a great way for you to have a say on what will happen in your community, both now and in the future.

We are building a city where everyone can belong and participate in social, cultural, economic and civic life and since 2017 we have been members of the Welcoming Cities network. In July we announced our Kilburn Community Centre as the new home for the Welcoming Centre. With its vibrant, diverse population, PAE is proud to host this safe,

supportive space for refugee families, people who are new to Australia and the local community. This announcement came the same week we celebrated the completion of the upgrade of nearby Prospect Road, with better lighting, new shady outdoor spaces and some wonderful new pieces of artwork to enjoy. With the arrival of spring, the days are getting longer, giving everyone a reason to get out and about and enjoy the warmer weather. There are plenty of events to choose from in PAE this spring, including special film screenings as part of the Adelaide Film Festival, workshops for the Nature Festival, and the Semaphore Street Fair. Whether you are looking for fun and food or artwork and culture, there is plenty to keep you busy while you soak up the sun.

Enjoying the outdoors is not just about fun and festivities. Environmental protection has

become increasingly important to everyone's wellbeing and it plays a vital part in the creation of our policies and programs. Recently we have seen a pleasing growth in the use of our electric vehicle (EV) charging stations, with a total of 6,397kWh of energy delivered between April to June at 950 charging events. This is almost double the amount of energy that we delivered in the previous quarter. There are eight charging stations located around PAE and we are planning to install another eight stations in early 2023. For interested users, the first 7kWh is free for use, and charging takes between 20 to 30 minutes.

However you choose to spend your spring, we look forward to seeing you out and about in PAE.

The City of Port Adelaide Enfield is made up of 132,400 people and 9,000 businesses across seven wards. Each ward is represented on Council by either two or three Elected Members who are elected via a public vote during Council elections to represent their local residential and business community. The Mayor leads the Council and is also voted in during the election. Elected Members set strategies to shape the future development of the City and are required to make decisions on a diverse range of matters. These matters include Council budget allocations, the provision of services and programs such as Libraries and waste management, major projects, asset management and the provision of open space and recreation facilities. While they make decisions on things that affect the whole of PAE, they also act on behalf of their own local ward to ensure that the issues that matter most to their local community are heard and

acted on. The best way to have your say and ensure that the people representing your community do the best job for you is to cast a vote at the local government elections. Voting takes just a few minutes, but the impact is long-lasting. If you have enrolled to vote in state elections, or if you applied and were added to our supplementary roll, you will receive your voting papers in the mail in late October. The ballot pack you receive will include information about all the candidates, and this information will also be available online at www.lga.sa.gov.au/council-elections Polls close at 5pm on Thursday 10 November — so make sure you post your ballot with plenty of time. Once you have done so you can rest assured that your voice will be heard.

At the City of PAE, we are proud to see ourselves as a growing, thriving and diverse community. From the rich heritage of our First Nations people to the different cultures of people who were born in many countries around the world, together we are creating a City that is a unique place to live, work, learn and play.

We gather statistics about PAE every five years through the Australian Census. Knowing who we are, how we live and what we do helps us make decisions about how our community can continue to thrive and prosper.

PAE is a growing City. Since 2016, the number of people living in our City has increased about 9% from 121,230 to 132,400 in 2021.

Many of PAE's residents are young and active. There are more people aged between 25 to 49 years old in PAE than in many other councils in SA. This age group has also grown more than any other in the last five years.

PAE is one of the most culturally diverse councils in South Australia. Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population of 3,296 makes up 2.5% of our entire population and about 35% of PAE residents were born overseas, with 23% having arrived in Australia in the previous five years.

PAE residents are keen volunteers. Over 13,950 of our residents reported doing some voluntary work in 2021.

A WELCOMING CITY AND A WELCOME CENTRE

On Wednesday 22 June, we celebrated our official Welcoming Cities Accreditation.

Over lunch, we listened to the stories of some of our newer community members, who shared their journeys of migration and settlement in Australia — its joys and challenges.

PAE was the first council in South Australia to join the Welcoming Cities network in 2017. Now, as an accredited Welcoming City, we are part of a national network of cities, shires, towns and municipalities who are committed to an Australia where everyone can belong and participate in social, cultural, economic and civic life.

In July, Kilburn Community Centre was announced as the new home for the Welcoming Centre. In its new location the Centre will continue to provide a safe,

supportive and welcoming space for refugee families, people seeking asylum, recently arrived migrants and the local community.

Its members will work alongside diverse and vibrant local communities and organisations such as Vinnies Refugee and Asylum Seeker Service, the Peace and Welcome Garden, the Kilburn Football and Cricket Club, One Culture Football, Lutheran Care, St Brigid's and other local schools, businesses and community groups.

PAE's diversity has long been reflected in our food, art, enterprise, traditions, festivals and celebrations. Now with a Welcoming Centre in the heart of our Welcoming City, we are proud to see ourselves as a safe, inclusive and welcoming City for residents, businesses and visitors alike.

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PAE LIVING ENVIRONMENT

PAE abounds with a unique variety of natural environments — from the saltmarsh and mangroves on the Lefevre Peninsula to the river red gums along the Torrens River. Protection of the environment is crucial for our health, economic and social wellbeing, both now and in the future.

In 2021, the City of PAE established the Living Environment Program to accelerate our environment and climate change action. We have allocated a total of \$2.3 million in additional funding over the next three years to fund a range of initiatives.

From a new community environmental grant program to citizen science volunteer projects through to the Living Landscapes Writers' Festival, there are plenty of opportunities for us to work together to take climate action.

ADAPTING TO CLIMATE CHANGE

The local impacts of climate change include a trend towards warmer, drier weather. Scientists also predict more frequent and intense storm events like floods, heatwaves and rising sea levels. The City of PAE is continuing to partner with the Cities of Charles Sturt and West Torrens in the AdaptWest program to assess the risks that

climate change presents for our region. Together, we have produced a series of community resources to assist households and communities to take action to improve their resilience to the 'cascading impacts' of heatwaves, floods, bushfires and power outages.

FUNDING FOR GREENER BUSINESSES

Are you a local business owner wanting to use your business to contribute towards a sustainable future? Our new Green Business Incentive Scheme funds projects that use renewable energy, energy efficiency and sustainable transport to help reduce the City's greenhouse gas emissions. The scheme also supports projects that use water-efficient irrigation systems and newly planted trees to cool our City and increase our tree canopy. So far, we have provided funding to 14 recipients for projects that use solar photovoltaics, battery storage, rainwater tanks and electric vehicle charging to improve sustainability. There will be further funding rounds in the future — so if you own a business in PAE, keep an eye on our website or contact us now to discuss your idea.

BECOMING RESILIENT

In April this year we received funding from the Federal Government towards the design and construction of a cultural and ecologically sensitive 'Living Shoreline' at the site of Yitpi Yartapuultiku, the new Aboriginal Cultural Centre. The Living Shoreline will improve the site's resilience to sea level rise and coastal inundation.

In addition, we are working on a submission to Infrastructure Australia to have Port Adelaide recognised as a national priority for investment to reduce the current and future risk of coastal inundation in the Port River region.

GETTING SHADIER

We are working hard to green our City by increasing our tree canopy. This year we have planted 3,500 new trees in our streets and reserves. These trees will make our environment cooler and shadier, provide more habitat for our wildlife, and improve the quality of our air, water and soil.

Since March this year, through our Get Shady Project, we have also given away 150 advanced trees to residents who live in suburbs with low tree canopy coverage. Next year we aim to expand the target suburbs for this project, so that more residents can plant and care for a tree



on their own property.

Meanwhile, a draft of our Urban Greening and Biodiversity Management Plan is now well underway. We have also completed two new Action Plans for our Coastal Dunes and Folland Park sites.

FUNDING LOCAL PROJECTS

Everyone can play a part in helping us achieve our goals for our environment, and we want to empower people to learn and participate. Through our Environment Grants program we are funding environmental project initiatives that will protect and enhance our waterways, coastline and open spaces.

So far we have provided funding to:

- The Semaphore Largs Dunes Group, for their work to control the False Caper weed at beaches in Largs Bay
- AUSMAP, for their nationally acclaimed research on the prevalence of microplastics around our City
- CareWorks SA, for their sustainability-themed community education program called 'Let's Get Growing'

There will be further funding rounds in the future, so give us a call if you have an idea for an environmental project that you would like to see in your community.

SCIENCE IN YOUR OWN BACKYARD

Are you interested in observing and monitoring birds and plants once a month? Our volunteer citizen scientists provide us with information that is entered into a nationally recognised database known as the Atlas of Living Australia. Through this central 'live' database, scientists, organisations and local councils can better manage biodiversity conditions over time. If you have the flexibility to volunteer one hour per month at varying times and would like to be involved, please let us know.

Our citizen scientists have reported over 45,000 bird observations since 2020!

ANNUAL PLANTING DAY

On Sunday 26 June, we held our annual Community Planting Day event at Falie Reserve in Osborne. Over 150 families and individuals volunteered their time to plant a mixture of 2,000 native trees, shrubs and grasses to improve the biodiversity in the area. There was also live music, face painting, a free BBQ lunch and native plant giveaways — including 100 seedlings for

locals to plant in their own yards. We held this great event in partnership with Green Adelaide, Australian Naval Infrastructure (ANI), Trees for Life and the Port Environment Centre.

NET ZERO EMISSIONS

Since 2008, we have decreased our corporate greenhouse gas emissions by 43% by investing in renewable energy, energy efficiency and low emission vehicles. We have also reduced the amount of waste that goes to landfill. To further respond to climate change we recently endorsed an ambitious corporate Net Zero Emission Plan that outlines the most promising pathways and initiatives and commits us to reduce corporate greenhouse gas emissions by at least 30% by 2025 and at least 60% by 2030.

Now, by using a Fleet Transition Plan and an EV Charging Infrastructure Review, we are ready to fast-track our switch to low-emission technologies.

Together we can play our part for the environment — today and every day.



EXPLORING NEW PROSPECTS

Celebrating the major redevelopment

On Saturday 9 July we celebrated all the colour and culture of Prospect Road at a community event in Kilburn and Blair Athol. This distinctive shopping strip has so much to offer — unique food, shops and businesses, and a strong local community.

Whether you enjoy shopping, seeing new art or simply wandering in the fresh air, you're now sure to find something you love on Prospect Road.

The completed upgrades include:

- more outdoor dining spaces to encourage people to shop and stay longer
- new shady local 'nodes' to enhance the amenity and create more 'places for people'
- new trees for shade and landscaping
- murals by Thomas Readett on Kintore Ave, Matt Fortrose on LeHunte St, and Kintore Ave and Josh Trenwith on Gladstone Ave
- better lighting, lower speed zones, a road reseal and new on-street bike lanes
- a major contemporary new artwork by Sam Songailo, which incorporates pavers and LED lighting pillars. The unique pavers pay homage to the traditional cultural designs of the different groups of people who live and work here, while the lighting pillars shine brightly at night with hope and optimism


RECYCLING IS IN THE BIN

Trial of new bins underway

PAE's Waste Team is trialling black-body wheelie bins made with 100% recycled plastic. In early July, with funding from Green Industries SA, we delivered the trial bins to approximately 100 households across three streets in Klemzig, North Haven and Lighthview.

Our local bin manufacturer, Trident Plastics, has tested the new bins in a wide variety of controlled environments. They believe that the bins perform to the same standard as our current bins, which are made from 30% recycled plastic. Residents involved in the pilot project have been keen to try them out and will let us know how the bins perform over the next two years. If the pilot is successful, we hope to be able to provide 100% recycled plastic bins to all properties requiring new bins.

Our Material Recovery Facility (MRF) has been operating for six months, and this move towards recycled bins is a great next step for us in supporting the local circular economy.


MAKE IT A LATTE

Barista training program on the peninsula

Local high school students now have the chance to learn how to make good coffee. Recently, the Lefevre Community Stadium acquired a commercial coffee machine, and our Active Living Team invited students from Le Fevre High School to undertake a Barista Training and Food Safety Handling course. The young

people thoroughly enjoyed learning the basics of coffee preparation, using the machine to create flat whites, lattes and long blacks for grateful visitors to the community centre. Each participant earned a certificate for their attendance.

We hope that these short courses will equip the students with the skills and confidence to gain casual work this year — or even a permanent job once they finish school.



A BLOOMING GOOD SEASON

Spring is on the way

With the end of winter, it is time to stop planting new trees and start enjoying the warm, sunny days of spring. This is one of the busiest and most exciting times of the year in the garden because it is when trees and plants bloom and grow in abundance.

Spring is a good time to compost, fertilise and mulch your garden to trap in any moisture in the ground from the winter months. Trees and plants love compost because it adds much-needed nutrients into the soil — especially if your soil is depleted.

You can buy ready-made compost from any good garden centre. Alternatively, if you have a compost bin, you can make your own compost by layering kitchen scraps and small pieces of garden waste between thin layers of soil in your bin. Top up the soil and turn it over from time to time to help it break down quickly. Later in the year it will be time to start pruning. The aim of our street tree pruning program is to give our street trees a sound, strong structure and make them look beautiful. Pruning them regularly also makes mowing the grass around them easier. Have fun in your garden, and remember: a busy gardener is a happy one!

SPRUCING UP OUR SPORTS FACILITIES

Gepps Cross Reserve upgrade

Work has started on a major upgrade at Gepps Cross Reserve to build two new unisex change rooms, two new umpire change rooms, a medical room, a new kitchen and a new public access DDA-compliant accessible bathroom. As well as providing a better space for community use, the upgrade will enable North Adelaide Lacrosse Club and Enfield United Community Cricket Club to share the facilities throughout the year.

In 2021 we undertook an assessment of all our sports facilities across PAE and found that many were in severe need of an upgrade. We are progressively working to upgrade all these facilities to ensure that they are appropriate for their intended use and that they maximise community participation — and that they are safe for everyone to use.

For this project we received additional funding assistance from the State Government's Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing, and we contracted local PAE business BluBuilt Constructions to complete the work.

After consulting with our community, we are constructing a new area that provides more open space for people to enjoy, as well as an upgraded play space and improved stormwater infrastructure to protect residents from localised flooding.

Although progress was delayed due to bad weather and heavy winter rains, we have

now completed stormwater basin works.

This included installing retaining walls, rockwork, irrigation and turf. We have also completed our underground stormwater pipe works and we have finished constructing our footpaths. Construction of the play space areas, shelters, garden beds and furniture is currently underway.

This project is one of our major projects for 2022–23, combining our commitments to upgrade both playgrounds and stormwater infrastructure. We look forward to opening the area to the community later this year.



NO SHORTCUTS TO SAFETY

Local area traffic management

As part of our ongoing commitment to making our community safer and improving local streets, we have been developing a Local Area Traffic Management (LATM) study for the suburbs of Klemzig, Windsor Gardens and Holden Hill. We have been consulting with local residents and the wider community throughout the preparation of the study, which began in 2021.

The LATM schemes set out how we aim to constrain excessive vehicle speeds, discourage drivers from taking shortcuts through local streets and encourage road users to park their vehicles safely. We are also working to improve local walking and cycling infrastructure to make it easier for people in these suburbs to get around on foot or on a bike.

YITPI YARTAPUULTIKU

Cultural Centre officially named

The Aboriginal Cultural Centre that we will be building at Western Region Park now has an official name. The project group met with local Elders to discuss ideas and concepts, and together they selected a Kurna name: Yitpi Yartapuultiku. This means 'Soul of Port Adelaide': Yitpi meaning Soul, Yartapuulti being the name that the Kurna people gave to the land around the Port River and ku meaning 'of', which is a Kurna joining word. On Tuesday 16 August we held a naming ceremony at the site, which included a Welcome to Country by Senior Kurna Elder Lewis O'Brien, a Smoking Ceremony by Michael O'Brien and three ceremonial fires.

Yitpi Yartapuultiku will be a community place providing a range of activities and opportunities for both First Nations and non-First Nations people. It will be an authentic place to be immersed in local culture with indoor and outdoor activity and performance spaces, public amenities, office and meeting rooms, extensive landscaping, artwork and entry statements and areas with access to the water.



AUSTRALIA DAY AWARDS 2023

Who makes a difference in your community?

With the new year on the horizon, it's time to think about the service and achievements of local people who have enhanced the quality of life in PAE. From September we will be calling for nominations for the 2023 Australia Day Awards, which are conducted in conjunction with the Australia Day Council of South Australia. This year there is a new award category, Older Citizen of the Year, for residents aged at least 65 years. EVERY X-RAY HAS A SILVER LINING

Recycling is best for old X-rays

Did you know that X-rays contain precious silver in the form of halides? Because of this, you cannot put them in your general bin. However, there are several places around PAE that will accept your old X-rays for recycling, including all Australian Red Cross secondhand stores. Recycling X-ray films involves processing them in a refinery at temperatures of over 1,000°C to extract the silver, which is then converted into pure silver. This can then be reused for things such as silver solder, jewellery, the silver plating of utensils, electrical components and film manufacture. Esma, Manager of the Red Cross Superstore in Hampstead Gardens, says that recycling X-rays is the best way to divert them from landfill. But

X-ray films are just one of the materials you can donate in-store. 'We are always on the lookout for donations of clothing, books, accessories and furniture and even have a delivery service if you would like to donate larger items.' Esma manages a team of 60 volunteers at the North East Road store, which is open seven days a week. Before you donate your X-rays, make sure that you have removed all the packaging and notes. The X-rays are placed straight into a large bin before they are taken away and melted down, so you don't need to worry about your medical information being accessed. Other local places you can take your X-rays for recycling are the Red Cross Shop at North Haven Shopping Centre, the Port Environment Centre on North Parade in Port Adelaide, or SiltechPMR at 3/17-19 Plymouth Rd, Wingfield, where a 24-hour drop-off bin is available.

Nunga Week is the City of PAE's acknowledgement of the contribution that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people make to our community. With a special focus on partnerships between PAE and other local groups and organisations, it is held in the second week of November each year and includes celebrations across the region. We received additional funding for this project through the Federal Government's 'Building Our Future' Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program. 
