### Ward in focus Semaphore

The Semaphore Ward extends from the coast to the Port Adelaide River. It includes the suburbs of Semaphore, Exeter, Birkenhead, Peterhead, Largs North and parts of Port Adelaide. The current suburb of Semaphore once included many small subdivisions ('townships'), which were given their own names by their original developers. These included areas previously known as Alderley, Clairville, Clairville North, Kew, Plymouth, Scarborough, South Scarborough, Semaphore North and Weymouth.

Birkenhead Naval Reserve is located on the corner of Fletcher Road and Heath Street in Largs Bay. The reserve is named in honour of the Naval service after a history of naval equipment being installed there.

The upgrade of the Birkenhead Naval Reserve was made possible through \$1.5 million funding from the Australian Government through the Local Roads and Community

Hindmarsh, Mark Butler MP with the grant application. This program supports local councils to deliver priority local road and community infrastructure projects across Australia, supporting jobs and the resilience of local economies to help communities bounce back from the COVID-19 pandemic. Following receiving this funding Council undertook community consultation to understand the way the reserve is currently being used and what the priorities are for the planned upgrades. The upgrades for the reserve include a new play space, biodiverse planting, a new irrigation system and turf on the large open space for the community to enjoy. The open space portion of the reserve will also double as a stormwater detention basin to ease flooding and a pump station is currently being installed to account for the impacts of climate change.

The design of the open space aims to reflect both the rich Aboriginal and naval history of the area.

Like choosing a favourite child, it's practically impossible to decide what I love most about Semaphore. Its nostalgic and laid-back vibes make our local area feel like a perfect paradise;

a little-known secret held by only a handful of people. Whether it's admiring the beauty of Semaphore and Largs jetties, grabbing a coffee at our fabulous local cafés, or enjoying our natural environment along the coastal path, I really do feel so lucky to live here. Plus, we've got some exciting Council projects on the horizon which will make Semaphore an even better place to live, work and play.

My family and I have loved living on the Peninsula for more than 60 years. I love the serene, ever-changing foreshore, which attracts a diverse mix of community events including the Greek

Festival and International Kite Festival. I am proud to be working with the genuine and generous local people and community groups and feel privileged to still be here after just celebrating 15 years as your Elected Member for Semaphore Ward. Positive health on the Peninsula is very important to me, particularly as we now have 30,000+ vehicles on Victoria Rd every day. Five years ago, I asked for a study into the impact of this added pollution on our health. We have now completed a draft of the Victoria Road Air Quality Study, and results should be available soon.

he Semaphore Foreshore is a much-loved and iconic destination for Semaphore locals and visitors. It supports the local economy and environment, providing a strong sense of community, but has not been upgraded for a long time. Earlier in 2021, we created a master plan for the foreshore and surrounding areas. This provides us with the opportunity to reimagine the area and the role it will play into the future.

The master plan includes the consideration of amenities, resilience to climate change, recreation and play spaces, events and entertainment, safety, heritage, technology, accessibility and business activities.

During October, we invited the community

to help us form the vision and guiding principles for our master plan.

We invited people to have their say about how we can make the foreshore a more vibrant place for them to enjoy all year round for many years to come.

We also created a kid's survey, so that we could get ideas from children and young people about what they would like, and we held discussion sessions with local schools. We will consider all the feedback we received then prepare a draft master plan. Once the draft is complete, it will be released for feedback, in the first half of 2022 and the community and stakeholders will have another chance to have their say about the Semaphore Foreshore.

#### SEMAPHORE TAPESTRY

If you enter Semaphore from Birkenhead, you'll be welcomed by a new mural titled *Tapestry* that has been installed on the corner of Semaphore and Causeway Roads. A tapestry is typically made by several people working together to create multiple woven layers and it is traditionally hung on walls and displayed where everyone can enjoy it. This helps to keep the stories the tapestry depicts alive.

We commissioned local artist Mandi Glynn-Jones to work with residents, Elders, families, children and school students to design and install this huge tapestry mural. Throughout the project we brought together locals from a diverse range of cultures and people of different ages and abilities to help create the mural. They took their inspiration from all that is distinctive about this place, with the tapestry depicting the sea, sky, earth, trees, coastline and people of Semaphore.

We thank the landowner for the opportunity to display the mural on this wall, so that everyone who visits Semaphore can share this story and see the richness and diversity of the local community.



#### **SEMAPHORE LIBRARY**

The Semaphore Library, at 14
Semaphore Road, is one of five Libraries in PAE and the only one to be located in a heritage building. The Semaphore Library was officially opened as the Semaphore Institute on 15 March 1884 by Governor Sir William Robinson.
At the ceremony the Governor said, 'the opening of such a fine building marks in a special way, the progress of a town.'

Over the years it has been used as a theatre, cinema and boxing ring.

Work to convert the building into a library began in 1993, and the Semaphore Library was officially opened in 1994.

Today the Library has many wonderful features. You can browse the showcase of special titles, access technology or borrow a bike and take a ride down the coast. It's worth popping into the library on a trip to Semaphore this summer.

#### **COUNCIL ELECTIONS 2022**

#### Elections are on the way

Our Mayor and Elected Members work to make the City of PAE a better place in which to live, work and play. They regularly connect with the community and represent your interests, and provide leadership while also setting the strategy for the future of PAE. The Elected Members help us to manage our natural and built environment and create meaningful opportunities to improve the wellbeing of the community.

At monthly meetings, the Elected Members work together to make formal decisions about important matters that affect our community. These decisions are called resolutions. During 2020–2021, our Elected Members passed a total of 500 resolutions, each of which was intended to lead to meaningful planning for PAE. Elections are held in all councils across South Australia every four years, and the next Council elections will take place in November 2022. At this time, all 17 positions for our Councillors plus the Mayor will become vacant.

This may seem a long way off, but now is the time to start thinking about Council elections and getting organised to make your vote count. Council elections are open to a broader range of voters than State and Federal Government elections and you may be entitled to additional votes if you are representing a club, group or business. If you are interested in becoming a Councillor, nominations open in August 2022, so now is also the time to start preparing. #### **READY TO ROLL**

#### Bringing recycling home

This summer, the new state-of-the-art Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) in Kilburn will start operating.

The Central Adelaide Waste and Recycling Authority (CAWRA) has been established as a regional subsidiary by the Cities of Port Adelaide Enfield and Charles Sturt to design, build and oversee the operations of the MRF.

Our remarkable MRF will process our community's recyclables using a combination of advanced optical sorting technology and manual sorting methods to separate recyclables into separate streams.

The MRF makes it possible to recover and prepare recyclable materials, preventing these materials from going to landfill.

The Cities of PAE and Charles Sturt provided grants to CAWRA, and the MRF also received funding from the State and Federal Governments and Green Industries SA.

Visy Recycling was appointed to operate the facility. Paper and cardboard processed at the facility will be used as feedstock for Visy's recycled paper mills to produce new food and beverage packaging.

The MRF site also includes an education facility and an accessible elevated viewing platform within the building.

This will enable visitors to watch the sorting happen, with a direct view of the equipment in

#### NATURALLY WRITTEN

- The Port River and its estuary and the wildlife that live in and visit these habitats
- The Torrens Island Conservation Park, which is home to 69 bird species of conservation significance
- Linear Park, that beautiful oasis where reeds and gum trees provide dappled shade across the River Torrens
- The lagoons and mangrove estuary of the Barker inlet and Magazine Creek

There are categories for juniors, teens and adults, with prizes of up to \$500.

The competition is now open, and entries must be submitted by 7 January 2022.

#### REMEMBERING VERONICA BRODIE

#### Acknowledging an outstanding life

The exceptional contributions of the late Veronica Brodie were acknowledged at this year's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Awards.

Veronica spent many years contributing to the community, providing cultural input to the development of education programs. With her sister, she was part of a women's group that successfully implemented community programs. In the 70s and 80s this began with the Sunday Club at the Church in Dale Street, Port Adelaide and the Centre for Aboriginal Studies in Music. During the 90s she was involved with the Aboriginal Sobriety Group and Aboriginal Soup Kitchen.

Veronica's book, My Side of the Bridge, penned in the late 90s, provides insights into her life, cultural beliefs, and spiritual connections to her land. She was a proud, well-respected Elder, who also inspired and educated the wider community. Veronica has left a significant legacy in Port Adelaide through her connection to Lartelare Reserve, the campsite and story of her Great Grandmother.

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander
Awards night is part of our annual Nunga Week
program, and provides the opportunity to
acknowledge and reflect on the achievements
of the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander
people who are an integral part of the fabric of
our community.

## SHARING STORIES ABOUT OUR RICH CULTURAL HISTORY

Aboriginal Cultural Centre update

We are working with community to develop a plan for an Aboriginal Cultural Centre in PAE. The Centre will be unique, catering for Aboriginal people seeking to share, learn and practise culture. It will also create a welcoming place for non-Aboriginal visitors to learn about Aboriginal culture and the rich history of the region. It will be an authentic place to be immersed in local culture.

The idea of an Aboriginal Cultural Centre in our area has been discussed for more than 20 years. Our Aboriginal Advisory Panel has been instrumental in driving this project.

The site proposed for the Aboriginal Cultural

Centre is Western Region Reserve, on the corner of Old Port Road and Bower Road. The site has direct access to the Port River, meaning that interaction with the natural environment will become an integral part of any visit.

During November we released a series of videos that shared how important the Cultural Centre will be for local Aboriginal people and we asked the community to share their reflections on this project.

A concept plan outlining what the Centre could look and feel like, along with a business case demonstrating the project's viability, will be presented in early 2022.


#### TRANSFORMING SPACES

Plants and paints bring new life to Lipson Street

The south end of Lipson Street, Port Adelaide ends in a cul-de-sac that is home to Project 18 (a transformed old home now used as a coworking space for wellbeing practitioners) and Tauondi Aboriginal Community College as well as other businesses. Cyclists and pedestrians frequently use Lipson Street as they travel from Commercial Road to Grand Junction Road. Through a placemaking grant earlier this year, we supported local business owner Jodie Evans, the Founder of Project 18 and residents in the area to improve the space by planting 60 seedlings to coincide with Arbor Day on 20 June. The little garden bed on the embankment verge is now full of happy native plants.

Local young people and groups were also involved in transforming this area. PAE Youth, St Johns Youth Service and Harbour View FLO students created designs and painted six stobie poles as part of the Paint Ya Pole initiative. This project has enabled these young people to share their stories and express themselves. The striking poles add colour, vibrancy and whimsy to the street.

Why do people get involved in projects such as these? Taking care of the space they live in increases its safety and helps them feel a sense of belonging in their community, which improves their individual wellbeing.



#### PAE CHRISTMAS CLOSURES

Opening hours over the holiday period

#### THE TENDER TOUCH

**Growing with Basil** 

Diagnosed with high-level autism at three years of age, local resident Basil requires substantial support to carry out the tasks of daily living. Looking for a new way to keep him engaged with something he loves, his mum Litsa applied for a National Disability Insurance Scheme grant. Inspired by Basil's love for gardening, Litsa used the funds to pay for tradespeople to build raised planter boxes in their backyard. During construction, the workers formed a friendship with Basil and they continue to volunteer their time to help him stay busy and grow his produce.

Basil enjoys daily tasks such as watering and tending to his crop. He has a constant smile on his face as he works in his garden, growing herbs and produce which he then sells to local eateries, including The Banksia Tree Café and Folklore Café in Port Adelaide. He also makes deliveries to neighbours along his street. Litsa told us: 'Basil loves keeping busy and it is important for us to show that even if you have a disability you can still connect with the community.'

Mayor Claire Boan recently stopped in to learn more about Basil's work and join him for his deliveries so that she could learn how we can provide further connections to support our residents.

#### **BUILDING A COMMUNITY**

Affordable housing announced for Oakden

Hundreds of local jobs and up to 1,500 quality new homes will be constructed as part of one of the largest infill development opportunities in metropolitan Adelaide.

The project was launched in September at the 52-hectare Oakden site, through a partnership between the State Government, Renewal SA and Villawood Properties. Up to 1,500 dwellings will be built, as part of the new master-planned community.

This will support an average of 320 jobs a year during the first two years of construction. Villawood aims to ensure that 25% of the new dwellings will fall under the category of affordable housing.

As part of a Care Worker Program, teachers, healthcare professionals and emergency services workers may also be eligible for discounts of up to \$20,000 when they purchase a home in the Oakden development.

The development will include expansive green space, which will add to the green tree canopy of PAE.



#### **WE'RE ABUZZ**

Join the Pollinators

Enfield Library is now home to an observational honeybee hive and a native bee and insect hotel that you can visit any time the Library is open. See them up close inside the Library or watch their flight path from outside. Bees have very acute senses, and can be sensitive to sights, sounds and smells. To ensure you enjoy the best experience when you visit, we recommend that you wear light-coloured clothing and avoid wearing strong perfumes or aftershave. The Pollinators is an ongoing series of opportunities including workshops, walks and activities for the community to enjoy. The aim is to spread knowledge and to encourage participation via experiences to educate people about all the different kinds of pollinators.

#### Did you know?

- Planting specific 'buzz' pollinator plants
  can give native bees an advantage over
  honeybees. This is because only native bees
  practise buzz pollinating (where they use
  vibration to collect pollen).
- Plant species such as Hibbertia, Flax Lilies, Chocolate Lilies, Solanums (including tomatoes) and Lasiopetalum (commonly known as velvet bushes) are all buzz pollinated
- When using pesticides in your garden, you should avoid using systemic pesticides, as these can kill bees and other important pollinators



#### **LIGHTNING STRIKES**

Elite women's sports at the Lights

We recently welcomed the Adelaide Lightning women's basketball team to the Lights
Community and Sports Centre in Lightsview.
Having this world-class, international-standard stadium as their home venue puts this elite women's sports team in the heart of the suburbs and provides an opportunity for new fans to attend their games.

This partnership, which will extend beyond the next season, is part of our work to develop community clinics, youth programs and other programs to increase support for women's participation in sport, both at the Lights and in the community as a whole.

#### THE FUTURE IS YOUNG

PAE youth leading the way

This year, we sponsored young people to participate in the YMCA Youth Parliament. This initiative provides a platform for young people aged 15-25 to have their say on important issues, as well as to build their skills and gain an understanding of parliamentary processes. It focuses on young people's personal development and empowerment, connecting politicians and decision makers with youth voices and opinions. The young people from PAE really did us proud and we know they are set to become our next generation of leaders. In collaboration with True North Theatre Company we are developing a series of short films about local government, with young people telling stories from their own perspective. So far, the titles have covered what really happens at a Council meeting, what our young people most appreciate and what is on offer for young people at our Libraries. We will add more episodes to our website over the coming months, so stay tuned.


#### **INSPIRED IDEAS**
