You may at any time within ONE MONTH after the posting of this notice (that is the 20th day of February, 1928) make such representation to the Honourable the Chief Secretary.

I have your letter written on behalf of Lucy Blueskin, and her daughter, Ettie Mason.

The letter was sent to her in accordance with the "Maintenance Act, 1926", i.e. that the parent or parents be notified the Board has recommended the period of detention be extended for another year. In this case the Board has recommended that Ettie's term be extended until she attains the age of twenty one years, on that day the girl will be free from the care of this Department, and at liberty to please herself where she goes.

It is usual to place girls in a good situation from to their term expiring, of course, they may please themselves whether they stay in such home or not. In fact, every endeavor is made to place these girls suitably, in multiple situations in preference to detaining them in an Institution.

You may inform Lucy Blueskin that the Board has recommended that Ettie be kept under control for another year, therefore, she need not worry about her being well cared for.
