As we adjust to our "new normal" with limits on group gatherings, social distancing, and regular hand sanitising as part of our daily lives now, we are also looking at our overall economy, and leading our recovery to emerge as a stronger and more sustainable City post COVID-19.

To provide direct support and deliver a range of projects, we have developed a recovery framework and committed \$2.4 million to be used where it is most needed over the next twelve months.

We have identified seven key priority areas and immediate projects and actions where we can focus our recovery efforts with real and pragmatic solutions. Then, as additional impacts of the pandemic become clearer and we engage further with you to better understand your needs and opportunities, we will add activities to our long-term recovery plan with further strategies and actions.

So please talk to your Councillors in your local Ward (listed on Page 5) so we can be responsive and flexible as we gain a better insight into what you need to recover and be part of a reinvigorated, vibrant, resilient and liveable City with even stronger community and business connections.

# Ward in focus

# Port Adelaide

The Port Adelaide ward includes the suburbs of Gillman, Rosewater, Port Adelaide, Alberton, Queenstown, New Port, Glanville, Ethelton and Semaphore South. Glanville Hall, featured in our cover shot, was built in 1856 and was the original residence of Captain John Hart; Premier and Treasurer. Glanville was Hart's mother's maiden name. Hart's Mill in Port Adelaide was also named after him.



The Barker Inlet is an estuary, a semienclosed body of water where the sea begins to mix with urban land freshwater runoff. Estuaries are a particularly sensitive and biologically rich part of marine and coastal environments. Due to this process tidal areas also act as filters and channels for the pollutants and nutrients that run off the land and into the marine environment. Both the Barker Inlet and St Kilda wetlands have been identified as Wetlands of National Importance and encompass the coastal waters, fringing mangroves, tidal creeks and adjoining wetlands and salt fields from St Kilda to Outer Harbor. These mosaic landscapes are known as the southern area of the Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary and also home to the Adelaide Dolphin Sanctuary.



# HARD WASTE COLLECTION

We provide four free residential hard waste collection services each year to help you to dispose of waste items too heavy or large for the blue bin. To use this service, simply make a booking using the details below.

Your items must be placed out the night before collection and be able to be safely lifted by two people. Position items on the nature strip in a safe manner, clear of walkways, and not on the road or footpath, in an area not exceeding 2 metres in length and I metre in width (mattresses exempt). Before you put your hard refuse out, please consider donating good quality furniture and other items to local charities or op-shops. When you divert materials away from hard waste collection, you save resources and help us become more sustainable. We also recycle your hard waste where possible. Electronic items are collected in a ute and trailer, and taken to a facility for recycling. It is only where recycling is not possible that materials are taken to landfill.

# IF IT GROWS, IT GOES (IN YOUR GREEN ORGANIC WASTE BIN!)

Using your kitchen caddy for food waste presents the biggest opportunity to reduce the household waste you send to landfill.Around 40% of household waste is food scraps.

Placing food and garden organics to the green bin is great for the environment. Most landfill greenhouse gas emissions come from decomposing organics like food scraps.

Organic nutrients should be reused to grow plants and food, not sent to waste in landfill.

Food waste and garden organics make compost and mulch. This is a great soil conditioner for gardens, farms and sporting fields that reduces weeds and helps retain water.



# All food scraps go in the green bin, including:

- Cake and bread
- Cooked and processed food
- Fruit and vegetables
- Meat, seafood and bones (cooked or raw)
- Coffee grounds and tea bags
- Egg and oyster shells
- Paper towel and tissues
- Dairy products
  (cheese and yoghurt)
- Compostable bags and cutlery with the certified compostable symbol





This year we are trialing a different service for compostable bags because data indicates only one in three households use them. We want to improve access for our residents that do use the system by delivering bags as required before you run out and have to wait for an annual delivery. We hope improving access to compostable bags and caddies will increase usage. This is a trial and

we will monitor your orders to determine future distribution methods. Each residential PAE premise is entitled to 150 bags each year, and one kitchen caddy. Compostable bags are available for collection at Civic Centre, Enfield and Greenacres Libraries or to request a delivery of bags or a replacement kitchen caddy, contact us as below:

# **OPPORTUNITY KNOCKING** NECAP Team Op-Shop

The North East Community Assistance Project (NECAP) was the first organisation to receive a COVID-19 Response Grant. Co-located at the site of the Children's Centre at Hillcrest, this independent community service provides community support programs, and operates as an opshop. Typically, proceeds from op-shop sales are used to supply food parcels for local families in need. The op-shop was required to shut during COVID-19, and this left the NECAP Team with less resources to distribute, at a time of increased demand. Their funding grant was used to purchase products to keep volunteers, customers and clients safe, as well as food to be distributed as part of their emergency relief program. The op-shop at 489 North East Road, Hillcrest has now reopened. # **THOUGHT FOR FOOD**

#### Inspection fees waived for small businesses

We recognise that many small businesses have been impacted by COVID-19; including our cafes, snack bars and restaurants. We visit most food businesses every twelve months to provide advice and to ensure they comply with safety standards. We normally charge a fee for these inspections but are waiving these inspection fees for eligible businesses during the 2020-2021 financial year. 

# HAVE YOUR SAY

If you drive, ride or walk this way!

During July this year we began consultation to help us draft our first Integrated Transport Strategy (ITS). The ITS will help us to create a well-planned and people-friendly transport network across PAE, particularly in relation to road safety, travel time, parking, cycling and walking and the public transport network. We know that the community has an important part to play in identifying issues and opportunities relevant to transport infrastructure. To help us understand your experiences and perspectives, we created an interactive survey on our interactive consultation site at www.haveyoursaypae.sa.gov.au The survey even allowed respondents to use a mapping feature to tell us about particular locations of interest or concern. We are now collating all the feedback we received, which will form an important basis for the strategy. If you missed the chance to have your say, don't worry! Once the strategy is drafted, we will share it so we can seek more feedback prior to finalising and adopting the final version, which will guide the development of actions and goals for a better transport network over the next 10 years.

# **ON THE BEACH**

Mats make access easier

We have many paths right along the foreshore to help people access the beach. In addition to this, we also have beach access mats that sit on some of these paths to provide easy access for everyone.

These mats assist with crossing the soft sand to the hard sand. They are helpful for prams or people with mobility limitations, regardless of their age or ability. People using walking sticks, walkers or wheelchairs can use the mats to get safely on to the hard sand. The mats are even useful for ageing dogs who can't manage uneven sand. Access mats locations are chosen for many reasons including proximity to disability car parking and accessible toilets. We also take into account things such as distance from soft sand to hard sand, the width of the path, sand movement, and perhaps most importantly how level the sand is under the path, because to be useful it needs to be relatively flat. The beach access mats are still in the trial period while we consider public and staff feedback regarding the mats and assess the suitability of various locations. The path we have installed near the Palais will remain at that site.

Beach access mats are sometimes removed due to storms or tidal movements, or for maintenance. They are checked regularly by our foreshore maintenance crew to identify any issues. Each year the beach mats are rolled up over winter and stored elsewhere to prevent damage. We will monitor the changing environment where the rehabilitation of the dune at Semaphore has taken place and make a decision as to the best locations to roll out the mats ready for summer.

During May and June this year, we invited our residents, businesses and visitors to review the plan and give us information about what could be changed, added or updated. The City Plan acts as our guide towards the city we want to see in 2030. Our goals are arranged in five themes- Economy, Community, Placemaking,

# Property valuations

You may have been wondering if property valuations have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.Valuations are supplied by the Valuer-General for residential properties, and by the City Valuer in the case of non-residential properties. Valuations for the 2020-2021 Financial Year were determined based on the property market as at 1 January 2020. Consequently, any change to your property value as a result of COVID-19 will not be reflected in your property valuation until 1 January 2021. # **BUILDING BOXES FOR BIRDS**

Regency Men's shed in full swing

Members of the Regency Community Men's Shed are back in action after a short closure due to COVID-19. They have been building birdhouse boxes that will be set up in the Cudlee Creek area, to provide homes for birds in areas impacted by the fires over Summer. Boxes are currently made in three designs, the largest for kookaburras, medium-sized boxes for crimson rosellas and the smallest boxes for pardalotes. A design for boxes for microbats is also being developed. Men's Shed members are also working on a project to design and create "Little Libraries" which will contain books that can be swapped, and these creations will be placed around the community.

Changes to Regency Park Golf course

Big things are happening at our popular Regency Park Golf Course. We will be working in partnership with recently appointed course managers GreenSpace to expand and create what is set to become the best little golf course in Adelaide. A number of changes and upgrades are planned, but the most exciting is the creation of a new mini-golf site 'Shanx', which will inspire a new generation of golfers. Shanx will be a first-class facility that is modern, family-friendly, fun and innovative while keeping a community focus. It will be great for both experienced golfers and those who are new to the game.

There has been a renewed interest in golf over the last few months, because it can still be played while adhering to social distancing guidelines. It's also suitable for people of all ages, meaning it has an intergenerational appeal. Regency Golf course is just one of the three Council-owned golf courses across PAE, the others being at Valley View, and Glanville (pictured on the cover of this edition). There is also a privately owned course at North Haven.

# **COME OUT AND PLAY**

#### PAE Playgrounds to be upgraded

We have 128 playgrounds across the city and each year we maintain these, upgrade some and completely replace others. How we plan this is based on many factors including the age and condition of the playground. We are planning to upgrade eight playgrounds in 2020-2021 financial year. When designing a playground we aim to provide a range of equipment which is suitable for a variety of ages and abilities. We know kids love to slide, climb, jump and spin! To help us make decisions about which items you would like to see in your local playground when it's time for it to be upgraded, please come down to one of our park days and provide us with your ideas. Park days are held roughly 12 months out from the time the playground is scheduled for replacement. that all PAE Council buildings are smoke free, and that it is an offence to smoke within 10m of our playgrounds? These rules are in place to help all members of our community, and especially children, to stay healthy and away from passive smoke. So there's no smoking in council buildings including libraries, Community Centres, halls, public toilets, change rooms, shelter areas, sporting club rooms, depots, and sheds, and this is covered by the Tobacco and E-Cigarettes Product Act 1997 with SAPOL officers authorised to enforce the Act.

# SHUT THE FRONT DOOR

#### Keeping your pets safe

We get the impression that many of the pets of PAE have enjoyed having their owners at home more over the last few months. With families spending more time at home and an increase in the number of people working from home, some pets have had more company than ever. But, we have still had a steady number of pets reported as missing, or found wandering at large. One reason for this could be that while at home, owners don't feel the need to secure gates or close doors as often as they would if they were leaving to go to work. It's a good idea to regularly check your perimeter fence for holes, and make sure you are vigilant about shutting and securing gates.

Our Community Safety Officers have continued to work hard to ensure that lost and wondering pets are reunited with their owners. We have also recently had dog registrations due. Making sure your pet is microchipped and registered will help us to reunite your lost pet with you and avoid it being taken to a shelter. If you are taking a short break during the September and October School holidays, the RSCPA cat boarding services are now back in operation at Hillcrest. This facility boasts 35

deluxe boarding rooms plus a penthouse suite,

for cats and small animals.

# PORT ADELAIDE WORKERS MEMORIAL

At a Port Adelaide Council meeting on 23 January 1917 a deputation was made by the Port Adelaide Electoral Committee of the United Labor Party. They asked to erect a memorial drinking fountain on the corner of Commercial Road and St Vincent Street. The fountain was to honour specifically Mr Hugh Garland, a noted Labor activist and member of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers. But it was decided the memorial should commemorate the many Labor leaders who had contributed to the area, some of whom had died during the war.

A concrete bed was laid by the City of Port Adelaide on 1 October and the foundation stone laid 8 November 1918 with Mayor, Mr R H Smith officiating. In September 1921 a gathering of Port Adelaide citizens witnessed the unveiling of the completed Memorial, which featured 46 names of unionists from the area. Names have continued to be added to the Memorial; there are now a total of 136 names inscribed. Planning is now underway to commemorate the memorial for its centenary in 2021.


