

Ward in focus Northfield

The Northfield Ward includes the suburbs of Hampstead Gardens, Greenacres, Hillcrest, Lighstview, Northfield, Northgate, Oakden and parts of Walkley Heights and Valley View. It is bordered by Hampstead Road, North East Road, Sudholz Road and other non-arterial roads and contains the eastern most point of our city in Valley View. Two of our city's newer suburbs are located in the Nortfield Ward. Northgate was established in the early 2000s. Lightsview was formed by sections of Northfield and Northgate and a small portion of Greenacres in March 2016.



Roy Amer Reserve at Oakden is named after a Councillor, Alderman and Mayor who served the City of Enfield, and then Port Adelaide Enfield for more than thirty years. This reserve provides a lush, green environment for walks and relaxation, and is a family favourite for picnics. The wetlands at the site help us to manage flooding and improve water quality. In 2018 the exeloo toilet on the site was adorned with an artwork by Kilburn Artist Jake Holmes.

SPACES FOR MEETING IN YOUR LOCAL LIBRARY

To support our COVID recovery the library community and meeting rooms are currently available for free for students, educators, small businesses, entrepreneurs and job seekers at Parks, Enfield, Greenacres and Port Libraries.

More than fifty hours of access have been provided since December to support a medical centre to run workshops for community members to manage their diabetes, run a new yoga class for kids and teens and offer extra literacy support for pre-schoolers.

Library Spaces can be booked for up to three hours per day. Bookings can be made with a Library card, either in person or over the phone and COVID safe practices will still need to be observed.

Public toilet improvements


As part of our ongoing commitment to providing high quality public amenities across PAE, we are making some improvements to the public toilets at Port Adelaide Library.

SwitchedON is a program for those with little experience or confidence in the digital world. It is delivered in small groups, at all five of our libraries. The sessions are designed to help you develop your digital literacy skills. This initiative has been made possible as part of our COVID-19 Recovery Framework. Sessions are held Mondays at Semaphore and Port, Wednesdays at Parks and Fridays at Enfield and Greenacres.

CITIZEN OF THE YEAR AWARDS

Acknowledging local leaders In recognition of the outstanding groups and individuals who make a difference in PAE, we held a special ceremony in their honour. Citizen of the Year is Rose Darling, who has been giving her time to the Port Adelaide community for many years. Her involvement with charitable organisations and supporting other food relief agencies led her to set up her own charity Community Help and Togetherness (CHATS) in 2019. CHATS engages a group of dedicated volunteers who ensure people living rough can eat well, feel connected, and access the things they need without fear of judgement. Rose has built relationships with local businesses to collect bread, fresh produce and nonperishable items.

Young Citizen of the Year is Tegan Marshall, an

active member of the Lightsview community. She volunteers her time to bring her community together, and this has been greatly appreciated by many residents. Her efforts to create safe and inclusive ways for the community to connect during the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and included designing a COVID safe Easter egg hunt for local children and a Halloween activity map to guide children and their parents through the neighborhood houses. She has also instigated community fundraisers and other activities throughout the year.

Other winners included the Kindness Kombi who are the Emerging Community Group of Year, the Alberton Art Trail for the Community Event of the Year and Service to the Community Awards went to Susanne Blaschka, Barbara Boden, Trevor Charlton, Pamela Jenkins, Amber Trappel and Wonderwalls Port Adelaide.

REDUCING PLASTICS

Single use ban

Plastics play an important role in our economy and daily lives. But too often, the way plastics are produced, used and discarded results in a wasted resource, causing pollution, litter and harming marine life. Single-use plastic straws, cutlery and stirrers are now prohibited from sale, supply or distribution in South Australia. These single-use items can be easily replaced with reusable and compostable alternatives. Polystyrene cups, bowls plates and clamshell containers are also prohibited from manufacture and production in the state. RESERVE NAMING

Ngarrpadla 'Aunty' Josie Agius

In February we gathered together for the naming of our first dual-named reserve. Ngarrpadla (the Kaurna word for aunty) 'Aunty' Josie Agius Reserve has been named in honour of Aboriginal Elder and local Taperoo resident, Aunty Josie Agius, who was a Narungga, Kaurna, Ngarrindjeri and Ngadjuri leader born in 1934.We are proud of the Aboriginal heritage of PAE and acknowledge and value the connection and significant contribution made by Aboriginal people through their maintenance and sharing of culture and connection to country.

In 2020, the PAE Aboriginal Advisory Panel suggested that Taperoo Reserve, originally named for its location at Taperoo, be renamed with dual names that better reflect local Aboriginal history and culture. Auntie Josie was a proud and active member of the Port Adelaide community for over 55 years. As one of the State's first Aboriginal health workers, she helped develop cultural protocols for hospitals and community health services in the 1970s. In the 1980s she was an Aboriginal education worker at Taperoo Primary School, where she helped launch the Port Adelaide based Kurruru Indigenous Youth Art Centre. She returned to school at Tauondi College in 1995 at the age of 61, and studied tourism and the Kaurna language to further her life-long commitment to learning.

Aunty Josie was recognised for her tireless advocacy for reconciliation. In 2014 she was awarded the Premier's NAIDOC Award as an extraordinary South Australian whose outstanding achievements and activities have made a significant difference to the lives and welfare of the State's Aboriginal people. She was so prominent in the community and the State that at her 2015 funeral service in Port Adelaide, the South Australian Governor Hieu Van Le, the then Premier Jay Weatherill, and the then State Aboriginal Affairs Minister Kyam Maher, were among those present to mourn the passing of the 81-year-old community leader. The renaming of this reserve is a fitting tribute to an important PAE community member.

Tracy runs the Heart of Semaphore Café on Semaphore Road. She describes herself as a passionate person and loves sharing her enthusiasm

for life and learning with others. Each day she challenges herself to try and make at least one person's day better.

Whoever you are or where you are from, you're welcome here. We love it here, and being able to give back to someone is very special.

When Tracy moved from England with her four daughters, she felt truly accepted and embraced by the local community in the Semaphore area, and

found herself really wanting to give back. She founded and opened the Heart of Semaphore Café, and has created a welcoming place for local

people to gather and share. The café offers an extensive workshop program and runs regular groups and activities. Kids cooking and craft classes are offered during the school holidays, and there's cards, crafts and knitting for the grownups. The café will host our upcoming Great

Community Plant Swap on 23 March. Those who frequent the café are always welcoming

to new visitors, taking them under their wing and Tracy has been touched to see the way so many connections are made and bonds formed, here in the heart of Semaphore.

Tracy has always had a keen interest in food and nutrition and the way that food can bring people together. She loves using shared foods as a way of exploring culture and commonalities.

Jetty Road upgrades

The newly upgraded Jetty Road in Largs Bay is now a more welcoming place for locals and visitors alike.

Wider footpaths allow for safer pedestrian access, as well as future outdoor dining for nearby businesses. We've lowered the kerbing, installed new ramps and upgraded pedestrian crossings, to help improve accessibility in the area. Safety has also been improved with better and brighter street lighting. The road has been resurfaced with improved parking right along the street. We've also planted new verges, trees and grass to improve the streetscape.

To complete the project, there are some fantastic new sculptures along the footpath by SA artist Quentin Gore, who worked with the local community to create vessel-shaped granite forms and wooden figures which celebrate the rich cultural diversity of the area. The sculptures feature text developed by our Aboriginal Advisory Panel member Mickey O' Brien. This will deliver long-term community and economic development outcomes for Largs Bay businesses and residents and create spaces to be enjoyed.

CHANGING PLACES

New planning and development rules

On Friday 19 March, the SA Government's new state-wide Planning and Design Code will replace our current Development Plan. Every property in the City of PAE will be rezoned to a new "Code" zone and all new development applications will be considered against the new rules using a centralised lodgement and assessment system. The Code will change the fees for development applications and when and how public notification occurs. One of the more visible changes will be that when a development application requires public notification, a sign will be placed on the land where the development is proposed.

The State Government's reform of the planning system began in 2013. Over the course of the reform program, we have made many submissions and representations to try to ensure the best possible outcomes for our community and that the new planning rules remain reflective of local issues and conditions.

We'll be monitoring the development outcomes that the Code delivers and will

seek the Government's support for future amendments to the Code if required. www.plan.sa.gov.au

CREATING OPPORTUNITIES

Welcoming new trainees

Our City of PAE trainee program has grown in 2021 as we welcome 13 new young people who have joined us for the year to undertake this intensive on-the-job education. For the first time, we have welcomed trainees to all areas of the organisation, from outside in the field doing horticulture and construction, to office-based project management, customer service, and administration.



Community transport options

We provide community vans and medical transport vehicles to assist eligible residents over the age of 65 to get to the shops, social groups or medical appointments. Our friendly volunteer drivers will not only help you to get about, but will also assist you throughout your journey, have a chat and even a laugh. PAE Transport is a door to door service so you won't even have to walk to a bus stop or wait in line for a taxi. Our medical car will get you to health appointments. Volunteers drivers will pick you up from your home to ensure you get to your appointment with plenty of time to spare. Due to the demand for this service, we are only able to provide one-way transport. This is not an ambulance service so if you need urgent medical assistance dial 000. These low-cost options for transport are supported by the Commonwealth Home Support Program, so there are some eligibility criteria that needs to be discussed to access transport. For more info:

SUMMER RAIN

Stormwater management update

We experienced some unusually wet weather towards the end of January, with an incredible amount of rainfall in a short period of time. We are continually upgrading stormwater infrastructure to prevent flooding in our streets. However, the deluge generated more water than the stormwater systems could handle across Adelaide. In recent years we have built new pump stations around the peninsula to discharge stormwater and we have also increased the size of underground pipes across the city. To keep the water flowing away from residential areas, we have around \$470 million worth of stormwater infrastructure in PAE, most of which is hidden underground. This includes over 550 km of stormwater channels and pipes, 90 detention basins, 4,000 pits, over 10,000 inlets, and countless pumps and mechanical systems to keep the water flowing.

We will also be undertaking over \$171 million worth of new and upgraded stormwater infrastructure over the next 20 years.

In 1918, the Australian Government offered a prize of \pounds 10,000 for the first flight from England to Australia. The flight could not exceed 30 days and the plane had to be piloted by Australians.

A team of four Adelaide airmen responded to the challenge and chose a converted Vickers Vimy bomber for their flight. The pilot was Capt Ross Smith and his brother Lt Keith Smith was the navigator while Jim Bennett and Wally Shiers accompanied the flight as engineers.

On 12 November 1919, they departed from Hounslow in England and flew via France, across the Syrian Desert, and over Java, finally arriving in Darwin on 10 December 1919.

Serious engine trouble delayed their arrival into Melbourne for seven weeks and it was not until 23 March 1920 that they arrived at their hometown of Adelaide where they were welcomed by an estimated crowd of 20,000 people at an aerodrome in Enfield. The actual landing site is thought to be in the area west from this point and a memorial plaque commemorating the inaugral flight is now at the eponymous **Vickers Vimy Reserve, Northfield.**

MAY DAY

Bringing workers' stories to life


The Port Adelaide Workers' Memorial stands at the corner of St Vincent St and Commercial Rd. The statue features the names of local people who have contributed to the improvement of working conditions for workers from across PAE. The Port of Adelaide Branch of the National Trust is working on a project to help uncover the stories of the people listed on the memorial. A grant, provided by the History Trust of South Australia, will be used to develop a film called Labour of Love: Stories from the Workers' Memorial, which will feature the stories of the descendants of activists honoured on the memorial. A march through Port Adelaide on Saturday I May 2021 (May Day) is planned to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the completion of this memorial and the unveiling of this project. At the 1921 ceremony local business owner Mr Winter stated:"This memorial is unique, as it honors people who have worked unceasingly in an everyday way, sacrificing much that their fellows might enjoy a little more of the better things of life. The statue should inspire the younger generation to go on and try to make the conditions of life better, as those whose names are inscribed on the monument had done."

NEW COMMUNITY PRECINCT

Enfield Memorial Park

A new multi-function community precinct including a florist, nature playground and café, will soon begin construction in Enfield. Announced last year, this \$23 million investment which includes retail spaces, commercial kitchens and function rooms, is expected to provide more than 200 full-time jobs across the supply chain throughout the build, as well as becoming a modern, flexible and welcoming space for those visiting Enfield Memorial Park. Enfield Memorial Park has proudly served the community since 1946 and is one the largest areas of manicured open space in the northern suburbs.

This new building will be located on currently undeveloped land adjacent to Gordon Avenue and looks to incorporate the latest in environmental initiatives and technology. The new community precinct is expected to meet the growing needs of the local area for at least the next 50 years. Construction is expected to begin in the coming months with a completion date of mid-2022.
