We held our inaugural Dockside Festival from 9-11 December, and the Semaphore Summer Carnival kicks off at the Foreshore on Friday 16 December. Seeing how many people enjoy the beach during the warmer weather reinforces to us how important the open space along our

Ending the Year on a High Notes from our Annual Report

We have now published our 2021–22 Annual Report, highlighting our major projects, activities and achievements for the year. What a year it was! In the last 12 months, we have seen progress on many of the longterm projects that we are planning to deliver over the coming years. Our vision for an Aboriginal Cultural Centre came closer to fruition this year, with Council adopting and endorsing a business case and, after consulting

with local Elders, naming the Centre Yitpi Yartapuultiku (meaning 'Soul of Port Adelaide'). We also delivered on our significant capital works program, with upgrades to local playgrounds and sports facilities and improved roads and stormwater management infrastructure. HEALTHY AND HAPPY AT HOME

SUPPORTING OUR OLDER RESIDENTS

At the 2021 Census, there were 28,469 people aged over 60 living in the City of PAE. Older people contribute so much to our community as employees, volunteers, neighbours, carers and citizens. At PAE, we provide a range of services to older people around our City to ensure that they feel comfortable, safe and well connected. We receive funding through the Federal Government to provide services under the Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP). Our services provide entry-level support, designed for people aged over 65 who currently live independently in their own home and do not require higher levels of care.

SOCIAL SUPPORT GROUPS

Relationships with friends and family not only create a better quality of life and a sense of security, but also help to keep loneliness and isolation at bay. If you are an older adult, social connections are even more important, helping you to maintain a sense of belonging and community. Our social support groups are designed to provide people with an opportunity to connect with others, make lasting friendships and participate in a range of fun activities. Groups meet on various days of the week and include a tasty two-course lunch prepared by our cook. We can also provide transport to and from the group for those who need it. If you, a friend or a family member want to extend your social networks and have some fun, then contact us so we can help you find a group that you will enjoy!

RESPITE

Respite can give you and your carers a break from regular caring arrangements and allow you to remain independent. We offer up to four hours of care at a time, depending on your needs.

DOMESTIC ASSISTANCE

Our short-term cleaning services assist you in managing everyday tasks in a safe, secure and healthy home environment. Visits can be weekly, fortnightly or monthly and can be up to two hours if need be. Our cleaners can vacuum and mop, clean the bathroom, toilet and kitchen areas, dust, make your bed and hang out the washing.

HOME MAINTENANCE AND MODIFICATIONS

We offer services to help maintain the safety and condition of your home, including window cleaning and gutter cleaning. Our gardening service includes weeding, pruning and general garden tidy-ups, and can also include organic waste disposal.

We also offer a minor home maintenance service, which you can access when or if you need assistance with those bothersome small jobs that a tradesperson would not usually undertake. We can change light globes, tap washers and smoke detector batteries, or we can install key safes, magnetic door catches and more. We can also install home modifications in conjunction with your occupational therapist's assessment and diagrams. This may include installing grab rails, ramps, lever taps and handheld showers.

SHOPPING

There are a few options available if you are an older person who needs help with shopping. We can provide you with transport to the local shops in one of our community vans, or we can arrange someone to escort you to and from your chosen shopping centre, assisting you with your bags. Alternatively, we can send someone to shop on your behalf if you find getting out and about difficult. There are weekly, fortnightly or monthly options for these services.



WEEKEND OUTINGS

Our weekend outing program runs monthly, providing you with the chance to visit various locations such as plant nurseries, markets, wildlife parks or even the Barossa Valley! Our volunteer drivers will drive you to and from the outings in our vans, and we will notify you of the location and date in advance so that you can call in and book ahead. If you are interested in registering for the monthly mailing list for our weekend outings, please let us know and we will provide you with more information about the referrals you may require.

MEDICAL TRANSPORT

Our volunteer drivers can provide you with one-way transport to medical appointments. This includes GP and hospital appointments, as well as dental, physiotherapy, podiatry appointments and more. We can also arrange a taxi for you if our medical car is booked out.

COMMUNITY BUS

We operate a bus service to all members of the public, which may be particularly handy for older people who no longer drive but still want to get around. Depending on your location and eligibility, you can either catch a community bus that runs on a fixed route and operates on a Hail and Ride basis (meaning that you can hail the bus anywhere along the circuit) or you can catch a bus that operates a door-to-door service on a Dial and Ride basis (meaning that you need to book a seat). Our buses are driven by volunteers and provide transport to shopping centres, Libraries and other facilities. You can access the timetables either online, at our Council office or Libraries, or from any of our volunteer bus drivers.

ELIGIBILITY

Prior to accessing some of these services, you must register with My Aged Care (MAC) to receive a referral. Once you have registered, the Regional Assessment Service will conduct an assessment. They will consider your requirements and provide you with the appropriate referrals to the provider/s of your choice. Please note that some of the services above incur government-subsidised costs.


Beach Access Mats

Giving people with wheeled mobility aids (such as wheelchairs, walkers or prams) access to the beach.

Our beach mats consist of a long, sturdy 'mat' placed over the soft sand to enable people with mobility aids to reach the firmer sand at the water's edge. The mats are bright blue and are set up at locations in Semaphore.

WOLFIE'S EPIC JOURNEY

From Port Adelaide to Balaklava ... and back! Microchipping is the best way for you to ensure that you will be reunited with your pet if they get lost or go missing. A microchip is also helpful for vets when they are treating your pet. The owners of Wolfie, a Jack Russell X Staffy, can certainly attest to the importance of microchipping. While on a recent road trip, a PAE resident found Wolfie wandering, and brought him all the way to the Port to a local vet for scanning. Thankfully, Wolfie was microchipped, although he was registered to a family in Bundey, a locality about 50km away from Burra. Staff from PAE contacted the owners, who were relieved and thrilled that someone had found Wolfie in good health — although they weren't too sure about how to get him back home! Staff member Brenton kindly began the process of reuniting Wolfie with his owners by driving him all the way to Balaklava, where Brenton was attending a networking meeting.

If you find a dog wandering while you are out and about, it is best not to take the dog away from the neighbourhood where you found it. The best thing to do is to immediately contact the local council where you've found the dog. If you find a dog wandering in PAE, simply call us on 8405 6600 so that our Community Safety Officers can arrange collection. They will scan the dog for a microchip and then use the details in the chip to access the owner's details via Dogs and Cats Online.

THE WONDER OF SMALL THINGS

New book about a local legend

The late Vince Copley AM was a proud Ngadjuri man who was born on an Aboriginal mission. As a young boy he befriended, among others, the future civil rights activist Charles Perkins at the St Francis House in Semaphore. A star footballer and cricketer, Vince later devoted his life to advancing the rights and improving the lives of First Nations people. In The Wonder of Little Things, Vince tells his story with humour, humility and wisdom. Written with his friend Lea McInerney over many cups of tea, this is an Australian classic in the making, a plain-speaking account of hardship, courage and optimism told without self -pity or big-noting. Vince shares his extraordinary story of finding kindness in the midst of prejudice, and joy in living life to the full.

As part of 2022 Nunga Week, 80 family and friends of Vince and the St Francis boys attended an afternoon tea on Monday 7 November at Glanville Hall. They celebrated Vince's life, the publication of his story and the legacy of St Francis House to the local area and nationally. Other guests included Attorney General and Minister for Aboriginal Affairs the Hon. Kyam Maher MLC, Eileen Perkins, Mayor Claire Boan and members of the City of PAE's Aboriginal Advisory Panel. Vince's book The Wonder of Little Things will no doubt become an important part of our First Nations story here along the Port and coast. The book is available for loan through the City of PAE Libraries and for sale at your local bookstore.

During the first half of 2022, we gave 150 property owners a free mature tree to plant on their land. These residents were living in the hottest suburbs in PAE, which have some of the lowest tree canopy — Blair Athol, Clearview, Enfield, Kilburn, Wingfield, Gepps Cross and Woodville Gardens. WASTE LESS THIS SUMMER

Have you got your kitchen caddy?

With the festive season and the new year fast approaching, don't forget the difference you can make to the environment by using your kitchen caddy to divert food scraps from landfill. We provide free kitchen caddies to all residents of PAE, along with a roll of bags for the caddy that are made from plant material and are fully compostable. Simply line the caddy with a bag, then pop all food waste into the caddy. When the bag is full, tie it up and add it to your kerbside green organics bin. You can place all kinds of food waste in your caddy, including eggshells, bones and ground coffee. To reduce odours, consider storing items such as prawn shells or chicken bones in your freezer until the morning of collection day. GOING GREEN IN 2023

Grants to help community and business

As part of our commitment to supporting a low-carbon, water-sensitive and climate-resilient City, we are creating more opportunities for local groups, clubs and small to medium sized businesses to help us deliver on environmental and sustainable improvements to their operations. Through our Green Business Incentive Scheme, small and medium businesses based in PAE can apply for a share of \$75,000 of funds to invest in renewable energy, water/ energy savings, zero-emission transport/plant initiatives, greening, waste management and sustainable product developments/selections that encourage circular economy outcomes. We will also be providing \$30,000 of funding to local and not-for-profit groups through our Community Environment grants, which support community environmental action while also providing wellbeing outcomes for PAE community members and residents.

YITPI YARTAPUULTIKU

Progress on our Aboriginal Culture Centre

Yitpi Yartapuultiku continues to develop through a partnership and co-design model with the City of PAE and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Custodians. The designs for the precinct are progressing, being shaped through cultural leadership and cultural mapping knowledge. We have now appointed a Place Leader, well in advance of the precinct being built and opened, and we are developing a comprehensive business plan and a place-based approach to shape the shared vision of Yitpi Yartapuultiku as a culturally safe place for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and the broader community to connect, learn and enjoy.

The vision for Yitpi Yartapuultiku's place-based model is one where PAE and Community can together co-create a new and sustainable way of working and a different way of thinking about leading, engaging, delivering services and making decisions.

We were delighted to share an update about this project with our community during Nunga Week. If you missed this update, scan the above QR code to access the latest project updates. Recently, we were thrilled to receive recognition for this project at the 2022 Awards for Planning Excellence in the category of 'Planning with Country'. We also received the Ministers Award at the same event.

These awards are a fabulous recognition of the partnership between Custodians, broader Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander family representatives, PAE and the design teams who have worked so closely to co-design the Centre. This year at PAE we held Nunga Week from 7–12 November. Nunga Week is our annual acknowledgment of the many and varied contributions that our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people make to our community every day.

- We held 16 events at 14 locations across PAE. Highlights included:
 - A family movie night with a panel discussion at the Junction Community Centre

READY TO ROLL

Gepps Cross Reserve

By the end of 2022, we expect to complete our work on extending and improving the existing sports clubroom at Gepps Cross Reserve. Gepps Cross Reserve, located off Terama Street, is home to both the North Adelaide Lacrosse Club and the Enfield United Community Cricket Club. Both clubs are set to move back into their building by early 2023. The upgrade to the existing building includes the refurbishment of the toilets (comprising male, female and accessibility toilets) as well as a new public accessibility toilet, while the building extension will include two new AFL-standard change rooms with amenities (showers and toilets), a medical room, an umpire's room with amenities and two storage rooms. We are also repainting the function space and installing new flooring, and the kitchen is undergoing a complete upgrade, with a new bar, commercial kitchen appliances and a storeroom for food. We will replace the south-facing verandah with an area that provides more undercover room for people to watch all the action on field.

Capital Works Dashboard

Supporting Women in PAE

In 2017 the City of PAE was the first council in SA to achieve White Ribbon Workplace accreditation. White Ribbon is part of a global social movement, active in over 60 countries, to eliminate gendered violence. Both men and women experience domestic and family violence, including those in same-sex relationships. Statistically, however, many more women than men are subject to domestic and family violence:

- I in 6 women and I in 16 men experience physical and/or sexual violence
- I in 4 women and I in 6 men experience emotional abuse by a current or previous partner
- I in 5 women and I in 20 men experience sexual assault or threat

White Ribbon in Australia changed ownership in 2020. This year, on White Ribbon Day, Friday 18 November, we furthered our leadership and commitment to making positive change by announcing we are seeking reaccreditation for the White Ribbon Workplace program. We are continuing to provide employees with education, awareness, knowledge and skill development to identify and address violence against women at both a local and systemic level.

A Beacon of Light

We are leading the way with our Women in PAE project, which is tackling issues of gender inequality. Gendered violence affects everyone and we all have a role to play in eliminating violence against women and children. This year we also participated in the Clothesline project, with community members writing messages of support and hope for women and children who have experienced domestic and family abuse. In late November the Port Adelaide Lighthouse lit up in orange in support of 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, an annual international campaign that kicks off on International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women and runs until Human Rights Day (from 25 November through till 10 December). As the colour designated by the UN Secretary-General's campaign UNiTE to End Violence against Women, orange is a bright, optimistic colour that symbolises a future free from violence against women and girls.
