

This edition, we have a focus on our PAE Places grants. We want to work with you to activate and invigorate PAE's public places. So, if you have an idea for changing or improving an area in your neighbourhood, be it your street or a park, reserve, foreshore, riverfront, plaza, market, or public building we'd love to hear from you.

There is a lot happening in PAE. Our war on waste is continuing, and we have completed submissions to Federal and State Governments regarding waste and recycling, waste in waterways, reducing landfill, developing a national model for data collection, and the proposal to prohibit the sale, supply and distribution of single use plastics across the state.

We have also been working on the proposed changes to the South Australian Planning and Design code, which will directly affect every landowner and developer in the state. We have concerns about a one-size-fits-all policy approach for the entire state, the removal of specific local conditions, and the proposed lack of council involvement in many aspects of the code. It is good to know that the Government have postponed its release date to allow more consultation with councils.

We also had a by-election for the Enfield Ward at the time of printing PAE Today, so I am looking forward to welcoming the newly elected Councillor over the coming weeks.

With the Fringe well underway, and over fifty events on in PAE, now is the time to get out and about to enjoy an outstanding range of art and culture in all its forms.

I look forward to seeing you at a PAE Fringe event, and don't miss our Port Fringe Street Party to end the 2020 Fringe on a high, and discover what makes PAE so special at this time of the year.

Ward in focus Semaphore

The Semaphore Ward is located along the coast and meets the Port Adelaide River. It includes the suburbs of Semaphore, Exeter, Birkenhead, Peterhead, Largs North and parts of Port Adelaide.

Several suburbs in this ward have Scottish connections. Largs is a town on the Firth of Clyde in Scotland while Peterhead is named after a coastal town in Aberdeenshire, Scotland.

The Palais | Constructed in 1922 after the destruction of the Semaphore Baths in 1917, the Palais was officially opened by the Mayor of Port Adelaide (Mr H Slade) on 23 December that year. The Palais was built to complement the existing seaside recreational complex surrounding the Semaphore jetty entrance and foreshore, which included a fairground, bandstands, rotundas, shops, and a picture theatre. Popularity declined in the 1930s and the Palais was used intermittently as a dance hall until the 1960s, when it was renovated and leased to the Semaphore Surf Life Saving Club. The Palais represents a time when going to the seaside was a popular form of entertainment and is the last remnant of this beachfront complex, an example of a social and historical phenomenon that has changed in modern times.

Creating unique places in PAE

Autumn 2020

The laneway that runs alongside the RSL to Largs North Railway Station was recently upgraded with the help of a PAE Places grant. This is a very busy public thoroughfare that runs alongside the Largs Cenotaph and Memorial. Nine garden beds along the laneway are dedicated to unique military organisations and groups such as nurses, war animals, Indigenous Service Personnel and the Merchant Navy. The garden beds are sustained by an upgraded irrigation system and filled with beautiful plants. The area is looked after by members of the community including members of the Largs Bay RSL Dad's Army and FTroop and children from Largs Bay Primary School. The garden has truly enhanced the way the laneway is used.



The Pear Cafe used their PAE places grant for a street party to celebrate the Summer Solstice - the longest day of the year. The event included performances by local musicians and bands, recognition of local neighbours and inclusive craft activities.

The Wearable Buildings project delivered by Open Space Contemporary Arts has seen local community members work with experienced designers and makers to create a series of vibrant costumes that reflect our distinctive built heritage. This project has been inspired by the innovative designs of the Bauhaus movement and the New York Architects of the 1930s, who costumed themselves as their buildings. The structural outfits raise awareness

about our historic and distinctive landmarks and literally help connect people to place. The playful and innovative costumes include the Steam Tug Yelta, the Port Adelaide Lighthouse and Semaphore War Memorial. These Wearable Buildings help us share the unique and quirky qualities of PAE and will make their debut at the Port Fringe Street Party, and also be on show at a number of other upcoming events.

With their PAE Places grant, volunteer group Friends of Taperoo Dunes developed and installed informative signage to form a Dunes Coastal Trail at Taperoo. The signs, showcasing native plants as well as birds and other animals, attracted immediate positive responses from the community. People are now stopping along the walkway and engaging with the signs to learn more about the natural dune environment, demonstrating that there is a real opportunity for community education about our natural resources. As a result there has been increased interest in joining the group and contributing to the fantastic job they do in helping us conserve our beautiful and environmentally important local dunes.



Each year, in association with the National Australia Day Council, we seek nominations for our Australia Day Awards, presented to individuals and groups who have made an outstanding contribution to the community. This year there were many deserving nominees, and we especially congratulate the following winners in each category.



RIKKI COOKE Citizen of the Year

Rikki Cooke is a social worker, foster carer, single parent and founder of Treasure Boxes, a South Australian not-for-profit charity providing essentials to babies and children living in disadvantage within our community. She created Treasure Boxes when she saw firsthand the hardships many children were facing as a result of poverty, homelessness and domestic violence. Rikki began seeking donations of clothes and toys for several foster children placed in her care, and soon realised there were countless other children across the state experiencing similar situations. Treasure Boxes was created to help children like the ones Rikki was caring for, find comfort during traumatic times.

ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL KITE FESTIVAL

Community Event of the Year

The Adelaide International Kite Festival is a long-standing and high-impact event that attracts many thousands of visitors to Semaphore beach every year. It is a free event for children of all ages and adults to enjoy, it encourages community participation and attracts people from across PAE and beyond. This world-class event is like no other in Adelaide, with only a handful of competitors around Australia.

TRI-STATE GAMES

Emerging Event/Community Group of the Year

Tri-State Games is a sporting event for people living with disability. Lasting a weeklong, the 2019 event was coordinated by volunteers and supported by local clubs who encourage sporting fairness and positive lifestyles through healthy competition and fun. Tri State Games was held across the Port Adelaide Enfield region, with local sporting clubs hosting sporting competitions for interstate visitors.

HANA ALI Young Citizen of the Year

Hana Ali was nominated in recognition of her significant contribution to supporting young people from the Ethiopian & Eritrean Communities in Adelaide. Hana is a role model for other young people and a hardworking individual who dedicates much of her time to a range of community activities. Among her most recent achievements is organising an event for over 200 people to recognise and celebrate young leaders in the East African community.


WANDER IN WONDER

FUN IN THE SUN

Solar power for recycling facility

We announced last year that the Cities of PAE and Charles Sturt are collaborating to build a new state-of-the-art Material Recovery Facility (MRF) in Kilburn. This means we can take control of the processing and disposal of recyclable material collected from across PAE. Plans for a landmark MRF have been lodged with the State Government's development panel, and plans for the \$12.8 million Kilburn plant show a major solar system will be installed on the warehouse's roof to provide up to 100% of its power needs.

We also included a report by consultancy firm The Energy Project, that demonstrates that the solar power system could save both councils more than \$60,000 a year and repay itself in five years.

The MRF will handle all of the recyclable waste collected within the two councils, and we will work with local businesses to turn the waste into usable products such as road surfaces and plastics.

In our submission to the State Commission Assessment Panel, we highlighted the fact that recycling management had so far been outsourced to the private sector and thus "locked out" councils from important information and decisions about waste. This means that we have been unable to respond effectively to community concerns that have emerged in recent years, but this new facility will give us the opportunity to more actively and immediately engage with the ever growing need to effectively manage our waste.

HELP OUR HOMELESS

Reconnecting the City of PAE

We care about the health and wellbeing of our community, and homelessness is a very real and significant problem that we are committed to addressing at the earliest possible stage.

PAE is the only council in South Australia to deliver the nation-wide and federally funded Reconnect Program, which aims to prevent homelessness by intervening early with families and young people to stabilise and improve their housing situation.

Over the past 21 years we have been working with young people who are at risk of homelessness, to enrich their relationships with their family, stay at school, undertake skills training, find employment and participate in their local community.

Since July 2019 PAE Reconnect has supported over 60 young people and their families to improve their relationships and help break the cycle of homelessness.

We believe that early intervention, mediation, building strong family connections and providing access to support networks and mental health services can help to reduce homelessness and keep our young people safe in our community. We are currently looking at how as a Local Government entity we can work more effectively with the State Government, service providers and advocacy groups to reduce homelessness.

DOGGY DAY OUT

Public places for our best friends

We're committed to design and build public places that are safe, comfortable, accessible, well connected and with amenities for our people and their pets! We provide a range of public open space for dogs and their owners including a coastal shared path along the foreshore, linear park, time-share parks, and three dedicated off-leash fenced dog parks. These dog parks are located at Jack Watkins Reserve on Churchill Road Kilburn, L J Lewis Reserve on Stirling Street Northfield and Roy Marten Park on Military Road Taperoo. Our dog parks have recently been designated as smoke-free areas to help ensure that everyone can enjoy being there. All other parks or reserves in PAE are off-leash at all times except for those identified as a dog prohibited, or dogs on-leash (at all times and time-share) areas. For the safety and comfort of our littlest residents, dogs are prohibited within an enclosed children's playground or within three metres of an unenclosed children's playground. There are also four conservation zones in parks and reserves where dogs are prohibited - Barker Inlet Wetlands, Wingfield Magazine Creek Wetlands in Gillman, the Range Wetlands Wingfield and Folland Park in Enfield.

THE BUTTERFLY EFFECT

Bringing back the butterflies

Ottoway is one of Adelaide's hottest suburbs and if you live or work in the area you are invited to a public meeting in March to learn how you can help to Cool Ottaway. Register now for a barbecue at the Junction Community Centre, 2A May Terrace Ottaway, and learn about heat mapping, canopy cover, the costs of too much heat and the benefits of cooling with natural shade.

The Junction Community Centre has partnered with the Bringing Back the Butterflies (BBB) Project to work with the local community to increase tree cover, shade and their cooling effects to make Ottoway a better place. BBB is a project designed to educate people about our natural biodiversity and increase the native vegetation that our native butterflies (over 40 species), birds, bees, microbats etc, need to return to our urban spaces. BBB started in Port Adelaide with the support of a PAE Places grant in 2018. Since then the project has helped local individuals and communities establish over 50 butterfly-attracting gardens across Adelaide.

CALM AFTER THE STORM

Improving stormwater flow in our suburbs

When we experience heavy rain downpours, stormwater from across Adelaide flows through the City of PAE on its way to the sea. Major infrastructure works over recent years have seen the successful installation of larger stormwater pipes under roads to help manage creative and sustainable activities including going this flow, as well as new pump stations to move water around the peninsula more effectively and

> We are undertaking works to implement a number of flood mitigation strategies which divert stormwater flow away from the peninsula, towards the ocean. As part of this, we have six stormwater construction projects currently underway across the city which you can read about on our website.

STOCKADE PARK

Stockade Botanical Park, off Hoods Road in Northfield, is an oasis in a busy part of our City. The park was created in quarries adjacent to the Yatala Labour Prison site, which was originally known as the Stockade. These quarries were worked by the prisoners, with the pre Cambrian rocks used for the construction of the prison, which opened in 1854. Rock-cracking and hard labor - the

breaking of one cubic yard of rock per day, was a normal part of prison life, with this harsh treatment seen as a deterrent to other would be offenders.

The quarries were later used for refuse dumps and by 1979 were partially filled. Today, Stockade Park has five main areas that provide spaces for a wide range of occasions and events. It is a tranquil and relaxing park setting that is spread over more than five hectares, offering many special features including a 12 metre high waterfall that tumbles over the cliff of the old, landscaped quarry. The former quarry is now the site of a special sensory garden that is filled with colourful and aromatic plants.

Circus Elements


Have fun in a hands on quirky introduction to different circus equipment. Children will be given step by step instructions and learn classic circus elements such as juggling basics.
