This year started on a high with the opening of the much-anticipated, state-of-the-art Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) in Kilburn, which means we can process our recyclables right here in PAE.

Up to 50,000 tonnes of kerbside recyclables including mixed papers, cardboard, aluminium, steel, plastics, and glass will be sorted into clean commodities. These will then be processed into recycled paper, plastic and cardboard packaging, new beverage containers, street furniture, and more.

Finding ways to recycle our waste and transform it into everyday products is good for local businesses and our circular economy, and



ur Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) at Mill Court in Kilburn officially opened on Monday 31 January. The MRF can process up to 50,000 tonnes of kerbside recyclables from your yellow bins each year. On a typical day, the MRF will receive around 40 truckloads of recyclable material and will operate with 15 staff across two 8-hour shifts per day. The facility processes around 15 tonnes per hour sorting the contents of your yellow bin into clean commodities streams.

These clean commodities are then sent to be turned back into recycled paper and carboard packaging, new beverage containers, recycled plastic packaging and street furniture etc. The MRF uses the latest optical sorting technology to produce clean commodities that are ideal for use in developing local markets and helping to drive the circular economy. The quality of materials arriving at the facility seriously affects how well the MRF operates. Unfortunately, a significant percentage of the material that currently comes into the MRF is not recyclable. Some of the common items that cause significant issues at the facility include old clothing and textiles as well as soft plastics. You can do your bit by ensuring that you use your yellow-lid bin correctly. To find out more about how, and what you can put in your yellow-lid recycling bin please check our website. As part of our wider waste education program, the MRF includes a modern and interactive education centre, which incorporates a fulllength glass viewing wall and an accessible, elevated walkway. This will give school and community groups a unique close-up view of the

entire recycling process.

In creating the MRF, a joint initiative of the Cities of Charles Sturt and Port Adelaide Enfield, we are taking back control of our local recycling. The Central Adelaide Waste and Recycling Authority (CAWRA) designed and constructed the \$23 million facility, which received part funding of \$4.36 million from the State and Federal Governments. It is managed by CAWRA and operated by Visy, a global leader in packaging and resource recovery.

## **USE THE RIGHT BIN THIS EASTER**

With Easter just around the corner, you might soon have an egg-cess amount of Easter egg wrappers, hot cross bun bags and packaging at home! Most packaging and wrapping can be recycled. Here are some

tips to help you understand what materials you can recycle and how to dispose of them correctly. By doing the right thing with our holiday rubbish, we can still have a great time and help the planet too.

Aluminium foil	Roll or scrunch the foil into a ball the size of your fist before popping it into your yellow-lidded recycling bin.
Lolly wrappers and 'fake' foil	If the foil does not scrunch, it is plastic — even if it is shiny or silver. Soft and dry plastics can be recycled through the REDCycle collection bins at participating supermarkets across the state.
Plastic egg trays and packaging	Recycle these items in your yellow-lidded bin.
Cardboard egg containers	Separate any plastic packaging and recycle both the plastic and the cardboard box in the yellow-lidded bin.
Hot cross bun bags	Soft and dry plastics can be recycled through the REDCycle collection bins at participating supermarkets across the state. Visit <b>redcycle.net.au/where-to-redcycle</b>
Unwanted chocolate or stale hot cross buns	In the unlikely event you have any delicious Easter foods left over, remove the packaging and then put your food waste into your kitchen caddy or straight into your green organics bin. If you have run out of caddy liners, simply order more at

Kerbside Bin Collection in Autumn 2022

There will be no kerbside bin collections or hard waste collections on Good Friday 15 April 2022. If your bin collection would normally happen on this day, Cleanaway will collect your bin on Saturday 16 April instead. Collections will occur as normal on Easter Monday 18 April 2022.

Collections will occur as normal on both Adelaide Cup Day (Monday 14 March) and ANZAC Day (Monday 25 April).

# SO MUCH HAPPENING IN **KILBURN AND BLAIR ATHOL**

Just 20 minutes away from the CBD, this is one of the most diverse and exciting areas in the whole of SA.

A major upgrade of Kilburn and Blair Athol began in 2017 as a partnership between the State Government and the City of PAE. Our aim is to undertake infrastructure upgrades and other initiatives to enhance these suburbs.

We're working on revitalising this region for the more than 10,000 people who make up its multicultural and growing population. The comprehensive projects we will deliver will enhance the Kilburn and Blair Athol area with stormwater management to mitigate flooding risks, improved streetscaping, safe walking and cycling tracks, direct links to public transport, park and sports upgrades, updated playgrounds and local business support. We are working to create a vibrant and attractive community, with safe and healthy places for residents to live, work and play.

Central to these projects is the streetscape upgrade of Prospect Road. We are making improvements to a number of side street intersections along the road and creating a more pedestrian-friendly environment.We will also soon install public artworks featuring pavers and LED Lighting columns to add points of interest along this thriving shopping strip. This will encourage more people to visit and linger on Prospect Road, which already buzzes with new shops and culinary experiences.

We were fortunate to receive both Federal and State Government funding for the project, which we are due to complete by the middle of this year.



#### **COMMUNITY SPACES**

There are plenty of places where members of the local community can meet and connect with each other in Kilburn and Blair Athol. Situated on Gladstone Avenue, Kilburn Community Centre offers an eclectic range of community activities and programs, including language classes and employment support services. The café onsite makes the Centre a great spot to catch up with friends. Also located on Gladstone Avenue is Peter McKay Reserve, which has a playground and walking path for outdoor activities. A community hall on Le Hunte Street is also available for hire. Nearby on Lionel Avenue in Blair Athol is Futsal Park, an old netball court that was transformed in 2017 into a vibrant hub for social and competitive sport in the area.

#### **DOVER ST OPEN SPACE**

We are creating a new open space on Dover Street in Blair Athol, which will include a playground and nature play area, along with casual use soccer goals, a half-court basketball court and a barbeque. This site will also play an important part in managing stormwater and protecting current and future residents by resolving a localised flooding issue in the area.



#### SHEFFIELD CRESCENT

Work is underway on a new reserve and playground at Sheffield Crescent in Blair Athol, a joint venture between Housing SA and the City of PAE.

Students from Blair Athol Primary School were involved in the original playground design. Once complete, the new reserve will serve as a place of reflection for the whole community. It will feature a new playground and exercise equipment, barbeque and seating areas, paving, landscaping and a stormwater detention basin. A cultural heritage art piece will be developed in consultation with the Traditional Owners to reflect the cultural heritage importance of the area to the Kaurna people. We are contributing \$250,000 towards this joint project, which we anticipate will be completed during autumn.



#### **BUSINESS SUPPORT**

Our Economic Development Advisors have been working with businesses right along the stretch of Prospect Road that is in the City of PAE, to support them with development and growth opportunities. # CITIZEN of the year

Julie-Ann Finney Julie-Ann has brought about national awareness to suicide

and PTSD in veterans. In 2019, after serving in the Royal Australian Navy for 20 years, Julie-Ann's son, David, tragically took his own life. Despite her bereavement, Julie-Ann was determined to find answers. She knew that the incident rate among veterans like David was alarmingly high and so she began her fight to ensure that no other veteran's family should suffer the same anguish. After obtaining 400,000 signatures, she petitioned tirelessly for the establishment of a Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide, which finally commenced late last year. Throughout her journey Julie-Ann has taken on the role of advocate, lobbyist, fundraiser and counsellor, and her achievements are contributing towards the education of many. There is no doubt that Julie-Ann's efforts have saved lives and will continue to do so in the future.



#### YOUNG CITIZEN OF THE YEAR

Ma-Musu Nyande Ma-Musu is a young leader and community advocate within the

African Community in South Australia who was nominated in recognition of her work with young women from refugee and migrant backgrounds. Ma-Masu has created safe spaces for young African females and inspired women of all backgrounds to use their voice.







#### JUNIOR CITIZENS OF THE YEAR Kate Hall.

Amber Trappell and Penny Trappell Kate is a Junior Helper at Hillcrest Guides and supports young girls aged between 5–10 years. She organises and runs games and craft activities at most Guides meetings and participates in Carry on Guides, a not-forprofit variety theatre production. Amber has followed

Playgrounds' initiative by being recognised as an 'Asthma Champion' with Asthma Australia. She and her sister Penny are actively involved in PAE Play Streets, promoting fitness and play in the local community. Penny has organised and taught crafts to children. She also ran free raffles and helped to collect charity donations.




#### EMERGING GROUP OR EVENT

## **COUNCIL ELECTIONS 2022**

Check your entitlements and have your say

During 2022 there will be three elections in South Australia — one for each of the systems of government. A state election is set for Saturday 19 March, and the federal election must happen before the end of May. To vote in both the state and federal elections, you need to attend a polling booth on election day or apply for a postal vote.

Local government elections will occur in November, when the Mayoral position and all the 17 ward Councillor positions become vacant. Although voting in the local government elections is not compulsory, it is important if you are a resident to cast your vote because it is the best way to have your say about what happens in your local community.

All voting for local government elections is by mail. If you are eligible to vote you will receive your voting papers in the mail during October this year.

As well as residents, if you own a business or a property within the City of Port Adelaide Enfield, or are part of an organisation within the Council area you may also be eligible to vote in the 2022 Council Elections.

To check your entitlement to vote and to complete an enrolment form, contact us today. There are several different forms to choose from, so we can help ensure that you have the right one. The electoral roll closes on 28 July, but the forms are available now, so don't miss this opportunity to have your say in this year's local government elections. For more information call us on

#### **GROWING YOUR COMMUNITY**

Community Project Grants program now open Not-for-profit community groups from right around the City of PAE can apply for funding of up to \$7,500 through our Community Project Grants program. We are looking to support and fund projects that enhance community wellbeing by ensuring our community is strong, connected, resilient and inclusive at a local level. Careworks SA used their Community Project Grant to establish a community garden at their Connect at Enfield site on Warwick Street. With our support, they transformed a rundown outdoor space into a green and thriving community site. The funding also helped them to purchase and install a tool shed, shading, marquees and seating.

Now keen gardeners meet each week to tend to the garden beds, propagate seeds and share small plants around the community. Residents and the wider community are invited to attend workshops and classes, which cover gardening tips and techniques. Raised garden beds and interpretive signage make the space accessible and welcoming.

#### **CURTAIN CALL**

Share your memories of the drive-in

In February 2022, the Mainline Drive-in at Gepps Cross showed its final screening before closing permanently. The drive-in was operational for 67 years.

The Mainline Drive-in opened on 7 October 1955. It was Adelaide's longest running drive-in. The first movie that played there was Roman Holiday, starring Audrey Hepburn and Gregory Peck. When it opened, the drive-in held two sessions a night. It could also accommodate walk-in customers.

The mounds allowing cars to be elevated to view the big screen were dug by Hughie Wallis, using an old bucket tractor back in 1955. With the closing of the Mainline, the Coober Pedy Drive-in will be the only drive-ins remaining in South Australia.


#### **BUILD YOUR SKILLS**

#### Increasing canopy coverage

The suburbs of Enfield, Kilburn, Wingfield, Gepps Cross and Woodville Gardens have been identified as having some of the lowest tree canopy coverage in PAE. In response, we have set an ambitious target to increase our tree canopy cover by 35% by 2050. To achieve this, we need to plant at least 3,000 new trees in our streets and reserves and 500 new trees on private land each year.

Canopy trees in your garden provide shade and much-needed cooling during our summer months. They can also help reduce your electricity bills and increase your property value. **Barton Vale** is a beautiful residence that Edmund Bowman built on land he purchased in 1840. Originally called Enfield House, the building was completed in 1852. Sadly, Edmund drowned in the Wakefield River in 1866, but he bequeathed the property to his wife Elizabeth. In 1922 the contents went up for auction and the Salvation Army bought and refurbished the property, which they used as a home for girls. They also purchased more land.

In 1947 the Community Welfare and Public Relief Board bought Barton Vale and named it Vaughan House after Miss D Vaughan, a member of the Children's Welfare and Public Relief Board.Vaughan House opened on 17 October 1947. It was used as a girls' training school, and its residents, who were aged from 14–20 years, learnt dressmaking, handicrafts, sports and folk dancing. It became part of Gepps Cross Girls High School in the late 60s. It is now a private residence.

#### **ON YOUR BIKE**

#### Enjoy our Greenway today

Constructed jointly over 15 years by the State Government's Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) and the Cities of Charles Sturt, Adelaide and PAE, the Outer Harbor Greenway provides a safe, direct and continuous link to and from the City to Port Adelaide and the Lefevre Peninsula.

I have been using the Greenway to commute to the CBD from Albert park. **So easy and much more picturesque** than Port Road! I highly recommend using it instead of the main roads.''

The Greenway is a shared-use pathway, open to bike riders, skaters, pedestrians and people using other mobility devices. The route is quiet and picturesque, extending I 3km between the Port and the Adelaide Parklands and CBD. By bike the journey takes approximately 35–40 minutes. The route is clearly sign-posted, following local streets and railway terraces and including some dedicated off-road pathways. There are dedicated, light-controlled crossings, new bridges and underpasses at all major road crossings.

From Port Adelaide the Greenway also extends northwards for 7km to Outer Harbor, providing an excellent route between suburbs on Lefevre Peninsula to shops and services in the Port CBD. It links conveniently with the Semaphore Road bikeway network, making shopping, services and of course the beachfront and Coast Park pathway easily accessible.

Use of the Greenway has been increasing steadily. A bike counter indicated a monthly total for January 2021 of 10,326 bikes. That's about 333 bikes per day! Riding a bike is good for you and for our environment plus, it's fun! Children as young as 10 who have some cycling experience can enjoy the path with a parent or guardian. As part of our first Integrated Transport Strategy (ITS) we conducted community consultation, and you told us that active transport, specifically walking and cycling, are very important. As a result, we have developed a new Walking and Cycling Plan. This will help us to create a safer and more accessible network so that we can choose walking and cycling as our main modes of transport. We are currently reviewing the feedback you gave us on the new Walking and Cycling Plan, which we will finalise later this year.

#### JERVOIS BRIDGE CONTROL Tower

#### Finally in a new home

The Jervois Bridge control tower now has a permanent home on display near the water by Hart's Mill, following heavy restoration and protective works at our Kilburn Depot. This important piece of Port Adelaide's history was awarded a Historic Engineering Marker in 1994 due to its technological, historic and social significance. Previously situated over the entrance to the former car park on Nile Street next to the bridge, it was removed in 2016 to allow construction of the new State Government building. The original Jervois Bridge opened in 1878 and was the only link between the Port and the Lefevre Peninsula. A person sat in the wooden tower on top of the steel gantry that crossed the road to control the swing mechanism on the original bridge. At that time, Port Adelaide was a bustling maritime gateway for the state of South Australia. The Government employed a person who lived nearby so that they could quickly get to the bridge at any time of the day or night to let ships pass.



The workers at Sunnybrae Farm built Australia's first water-borne waste treatment plant. The sewage farm was part of the Sunnybrae Farm Complex, with the sewage farm's manager living onsite in the historic Sunnybrae Homestead. The disused straining shed with its iconic arches is still present on Pedder Crescent. It is visible from Regency Road. The study of wastewater was a significant tool in the detection of COVID-19. Amazingly, an Australian study was able to use archival wastewater samples to detect the virus before the first clinical case in Australia was even reported. This demonstrates the powerful impact that our past can have on our future and the importance of retaining our history in all its forms.

### FRUIT FLY ERADICATION

#### **Restrictions lifted across PAE**

Fruit fly is being successfully eradicated from metropolitan Adelaide. In response, the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) have lifted fruit fly restrictions in some areas, while some 'red outbreak areas' within the City of PAE have now changed to 'yellow'. If you live in one of these areas, you can now move fruit and vegetables anywhere within the 'yellow area'. Currently, the yellow area extends from Paralowie to Montacute to Darlington, and along the coast from Outer Harbor to South Brighton.
